Message from your President – Simon Newman



This message will be my last bulletin article as president of Congregation Etz Chaim. For the record, this entry will be my 25th message.

In January, 2015, when Etz Chaim officially began, I commenced my presidency. I was not directly chosen by a vote of the congregation, but rather selected by the steering committee. Our merger

agreement dictated that the first president of the new congregation would come from the former B'nai Tzedek. Despite this unique appointment, I felt accepted and supported by the entire congregation. For that reception, I am extremely grateful.

The last two plus years have been an extraordinary journey, and, initially, one I doubted I was prepared to take. Surely, it was going to be a huge challenge, and I questioned if I was up to the task. We were combining two very different groups of people regarding their expectations of what a conservative synagogue should be with respect to religious services, and educational and social programming. Remember, it took a full two years just to get to the starting line.

Unquestionably, there was a lot of anxiety as we embarked upon this journey into the unknown. Would it work? Or would the naysayers be right that it just couldn't be done. Were the two congregations really too disparate in their personalities? I must admit that for the first few months I wasn't sure what would happen. However, I felt strongly that if everyone would just be patient, preconceived notions would disappear.

It is said that time heals all wounds. Certainly, the passing of time has allowed our congregants to become acquainted with each other and discover that everyone has the same goal of a hamish, vibrant synagogue.

I am pleased to announce that currently Congregation Etz Chaim is on firm footing and thriving. The petty issues that plagued us in the beginning are history. We continue to build on our successes. There is no doubt that we have the best educational and social programs of any synagogue in the city. During our first year, I recall that Barbara Miller of the Jewish Federation attended a Friday night service. She was amazed at the ruach and expressed that she had never been to such a wonderful Friday night Shabbat service. Considering her experiences within the Jewish community, her opinion is quite a testimonial!

Ok, it's soon High Holiday Time! The RITCOM has initiated planning for these always extensive and highly intensive but rewarding days. If you haven't already, get out those calendars (paper or phones) and write in these important dates to remember:

Selichot: Saturday evening, September 16th. Watch for more details

<u>Erev Rosh Hashanah:</u> Wednesday evening, September 20th and Thursday evening, September 21st

<u>Rosh Hashanah:</u> Thursday, September 21st and Friday, September 22nd. We will again have two <u>Tashlich services</u>, one immediately following Thursday day services and one just before services on Thursday evening.

Shabbat Shuvah: Friday evening, September 22st and Saturday morning, September 23rd

Kol Nidre/Yom Kippur: Friday evening, September 29th through Saturday day, September 30th. (also Shabbat) Followed by a Break-The-Fast.

Sukkot: Wednesday evening, October 4th through Wednesday, October 11th (Hoshana Rabah)

Shmini Atzeret and Simchat Torah: Thursday, October 12th through Friday, October 13th

Shabbat Simcha

Simcha means joy. This service will be coordinated by Hank and Chava. We have been working to create a service that brings to light the happiness and joy that is inherent in our religion. We have survived generations of persecution and still kept our yiddisha neshama, our Jewish soul. We believe that's due to a love of our faith and an innate desire to feel joy. Shabbat can be this island of simcha in a busy week. This high energy two-hour service is designed to fill your needs and send you on your way. It will feature the basic framework of a traditional Shabbat morning service but will be abridged to teach new tunes, include English and boost the ruach. This service will have regular Torah Reading with interactive Torah trivia to encourage congregants to read along in English. In lieu of a Haftorah this service will offer a component entitled "Torah in Today's World," a take home idea that can be applied to everyday life. It's a two-hour commitment of time out of your week that is full of learning and simcha.

Traditional Shabbat

This is the Shabbat morning service you think of when you remember coming as a child to shul or that your Zeide would attend. Traditional Shabbat will feature well-known tunes. the full service and a full Haftorah. It will also feature an insightful d'var torah. This service will revive the familiar and classic concept of "Shabbat morning services." In Judaism, the way to refer to someone who leads the prayers is "Shaliach Tzibbur" meaning "messenger on behalf of the congregation." We will be their kehillah, their community. When they lead, we will follow; when they say V'imru we'll say Amen. This service will evoke memories of days gone by and yet create pathways between our modern lives and our relationship with Hashem (God).

Mayim Chaim Shabbat

The name Mayim Chaim means "water of life." We used this title to convey the key concept behind this Shabbat, making Torah part of our everyday lives. We cannot survive three days without water, so too as Jews we cannot go three days without Torah. This Shabbat will be centered around the Torah reading and include thematic elements from the weekly parsha in the d'var, Kiddush menu and centerpieces. We will bring the biblical stories to life through food and other creative storytelling methods. This Shabbat will showcase our large group of lay leaders. It will feature an abridged Haftorah and davener's choice of tunes. Both amidahs will be heicha kedushas. Dip your toe in the water at our Mayim Chaim Shabbat.

<u>Neshama Shel Shabbat</u>

The service will be coordinated by Lynne and Candy. It will include lots of singing, and a bit more English than the traditional service. "Kavvanot" will weave teachings into the structure of the service itself, to facilitate a deeper understanding and connection to our liturgy. The service will include all the key elements and structure of the service, but will focus more on the *kavvanah* (the feeling behind the prayer) than the kevah (fixed structure). The Torah service will be abbreviated (with 3 alivot according to the custom of some liberal streams of Judaism), and musaf will be highly abbreviated, in order to allow time for an extended Torah discussion. This service is designed for people who are looking for a more informal service, with lots of singing. We will help deepen each other's connection to the liturgy and engage in the service from multiple emotional, intellectual, and spiritual perspectives.


Friday Night, August 11, 2017 Kabbalat Shabbat Services – 6pm Israeli Shabbat Dinner – 7pm Followed by a special discussion with Ethan \$10 to attend – RSVP to the office by Friday, July 28, 2017 This young man has an extraordinary story to tell... do not miss this evening. This flyer is about a holiday you may not know a lot about or that perhaps you've never really connected to in the past. The holiday doesn't get a lot of great publicity because we can't serve latkes and jelly donuts and it doesn't have a Seder plate. The holiday is Tisha B'Av (the 9th day of the Jewish Month of Av). Tisha B'Av is a fast day and mourns the destruction of the First and Second Temple as well as additional infamous events that occurred throughout history on that day (ie: the first crusades, Warsaw Ghetto liquidation, etc)

Perhaps a sad, fast day doesn't really sound like your "thing" – we understand that. Often times we're asked – "why should I care about the destruction of a Temple in 586BCE when I live in Cincinnati in 2017?" It's a fair question. I think if you reflect for a moment, or talk to a congregant who has been to Israel - every stone has a story, every section of land has a past. Tisha B'av marks the moment our lives were altered.

So, if you decide to come to the synagogue on Monday Night, July 31 at 7:00pm here is what can you expect. We will park and enter the social hall. We have contacted select congregants asking for pieces of Judaica that are personally meaningful and have created an exhibit highlighting those pieces.

We will also participate in a collaborative art installation. (Artistic skills are not required, so do not be afraid). The project will be set up in the social hall as well. We will have somber music playing and we will refrain from idol chitchat.

Following the group project, we'll sit inside our darkened chapel and by candle light we will hear the Book of Lamentations chanted. It has a sad melody and even if you can't follow along in the Hebrew, the tune transcends words and will make the meaning clear. And then the night will end.


