Message from your President - Terry Brodof



Dear fellow congregants,

As most of you know, I write this message about a month in advance. It is early November. I imagine as you read this, you are celebrating or preparing for the start of Chanukah. If you have never come to cook or bake in our kitchen for the holidays, this is your year to volunteer! Be sure to check your e-blast and the bulletin for the dates, times and more information.

A couple of days ago, I received a text from one of my cousins. It said, I'm sending you a little save the date. My mom is turning 100 years old next April. My brothers and I are planning a birthday luncheon for her. It will be at the Squirrel Hill JCC. We would love it if you could attend.

I have attended a number of family simchas in the east end of Pittsburgh. Members of my family live there and they have made it their home. The trip to Pittsburgh, always brings fond memories. Without thought, I texted her back "Wonderful! Mazel tov! I put it in my calendar and I am looking forward to being there to celebrate with you".

I put down my phone then picked it up and re-read the note. Never before had I given a thought to the location. The long drive perhaps, but never before the place, the neighborhood, Squirrel Hill.

I had just experienced that moment you feel when you recognize a piece of your innocence has been chipped away. The sadness the name immediately evoked. An event had changed my perception of going to a family event. Thankfully, just for or a fleeting moment.

Most of us have read novels like *To Kill a Mockingbird* or *Lord of the Flies* where you see and follow a character's loss of innocence. It is an experience, in the character's world, that leads them to a greater understanding that not all things are as they imagine. Goodness and Beauty are not always the reality. The behavior of people is not always a given.

In these novels, there is some incident that results in a loss of the character's sense of security. A life changing event. The characters then realize that their perception has changed forever and they grieve the loss of security in the world they once believed they had.

Perhaps most importantly, these works also teach us that the characters learn from what they have experienced and with that knowledge, they, and we, as readers, empower ourselves to move forward with a greater understanding.

So where do we start after witnessing and watching the violent events of 2018, or October 27th? The senseless loss of life, and the loss we feel when the reality of today's world hits so close to home.

As Jews, we start with *Henani*. Here I am. I am ready, I am poised and I am now better prepared. As a city, as a community, as a congregation, we are all now more alert and we are now, better prepared.

Safe Cincinnati has helped us to secure and to prepare our buildings. It is now up to us to prepare ourselves. I encourage all of us to remember this one thought. See something...say something! Trust your instincts. At home, at work and within our synagogue.

You will notice that in our synagogue, we have made a few modifications within the building and have changed some protocols during services and meetings. These changes came about after participation in many conference calls with USCJ, Federation and Safe Cincinnati. The changes are designed to keep everything as normal as it has always been for all those who enter the doors of our synagogue.

We have met with our service leaders and greeters, the board of directors and committee chairs. We have made changes to our safety codes and precautionary additions to our safety plans.

Our goal is to allow all of us to walk in to our home proudly saying *Henani!!* Recognizing we are here in our home, participating in services that our families have participated in for centuries, and feeling connected to the community. We will come together in solidarity, experiencing the warmth and joy of sharing Shabbat, or a Chanukah Dinner, or any other activity within these walls, with the members of this family. Never allowing hate and fear a victory over faith, love and courage.

Like the characters in the novels, we have been changed and we have learned from tragedy. From it, we have empowered ourselves with additional tools to move us forward; strengthened by what we have learned. Our community has come together in solidarity. After the violence in Pittsburg, our neighbors sent us notes of encouragement, Christians and Muslims have stood with our community, holding hands, side by side. Even our contractors have let us know they stand with us in solidarity and support.

I am planning to celebrate Shabbat and an incredible life story, filled with 100 years of joys and sorrows in April, in a tree lined community called Squirrel Hill. Until then, I will continue to walk into our building each Shabbat proudly saying to myself, Henani.



Chicken soup. Brisket. Roast chicken. Kugel – with and without raisin. Challah. Lasagna. Mashed potatoes and gravy. Comfort food. You know what I am talking about. The food we turn to when we are sick, lonely, need a pick me up or just seeking comfort, and after the shooting last month at the Tree of Life Synagogue, we needed it. We needed friends, family, community. We needed our comfort. So that Friday (the one after the event in Pittsburgh), an impromptu dinner was held after services. Twenty-Six of our congregational family around one table, talking, eating, drinking, telling stories and genuinely enjoying the company of others.

This has become another "gray day" marked on my calendar alongside other recent attacks that are almost impossible to imagine happening anywhere, religious or secular, equally horrendous:

- December 14, 2012 Sandy Hook Elementary School, Newtown, Connecticut
- April 13, 2014 Jewish Community Center of Overland Park, Kansas
- June 17, 2015 African Methodist Episcopal Church, Charleston, South Carolina
- November 15, 2017 First Baptist Church in Sutherland Springs, Texas
- June 12, 2016 Pulse Nightclub, Orlando, Florida

• October 1, 2017 – Route 91 Harvest Music Festival, Las Vegas, Nevada

I was talking to a friend, comparing how our attendance was the shabbat following and ruminating how something could like this could happen. "Poison" my friend said, "something just gets in them". Not a legal definition. Not a medical definition. Just a sickness. Just a little more innocence lost.

I have no words of wisdom to make this whole thing better. The only word I have is: Thanks.

- Thanks to our Military -- past, present and future -- putting themselves in harms way to protect our nation.
- Thanks to our First Responders Police, Fire, EMS personnel who protect us in our cities and homes around the country and come running at a moment's notice. Don't forget the dispatchers who answer those calls.
- Thanks to the medical professionals and caregivers who attend to the sick and injured.
- and, Thanks to our congregational family for not letting the poison in the world deter us from showing up.

Hey, Y'all,

Hope this message finds you doing well. We sincerely miss personally experiencing the special connection that Etz Chaim synagogue has with its congregants. The structure of Etz Chaim offers numerous opportunities to participate and absorb the richness of a conservation Jewish community. Although our synagogue in Jacksonville meets the standards of a conservative congregation, there is a huge difference in the atmosphere here and in Cincinnati. For example, in Jacksonville, all food is prepared by a catering service housed in the synagogue kitchen. NO ONE is allowed to enter that kitchen.

Additionally, there is a paid staff that circulates during the Kiddush lunch to clear the place settings. They are so efficient, that while contemplating whether to indulge in a second brownie, one's plate is whisked away. During these lunches, one feels like a guest as opposed to a member.

We miss the camaraderie of preparing food on Thursday nights in the Etz Chaim kitchen. Without question, volunteering to help prepare the food for Kiddush luncheons and special occasion dinners creates a feeling of pride and ownership. This volunteer opportunity certainly promotes a feeling of belonging to the synagogue community.

Moreover, the Jacksonville synagogue employs two Rabbis and a Cantor. All fulfill their job descriptions. However, there is a different sense when someone is conducting services, chanting, or creating a sermon because that week's reading has a special meaning for him. There is a passion not comparable with a paid professional. We miss the diversity of Etz Chaim services created by each individual's unique contributions. Indeed, the cantor's voice is quite pleasant, but it does not rival the "instantaneous, spontaneous choir".

Surprisingly, throughout the past year, we have not yet met anyone from the membership committee. We assume that there is a ritual committee, but we have no knowledge of their whereabouts. About a month ago, Pam was asked to be on the committee for planning the synagogue's Chanukah party. After a few meetings, it was determined that everything will be done exactly the same as last year. When asked what the committee members need to do prior to, and during the event, the answer was nothing. The staff will arrange the room and clean the room afterwards. The latkes and other food will be prepared and served by the caterers. The main function of the committee members is simply to attend. What a hollow feeling.

In essence, we encourage you to appreciate and embrace everything that Etz Chaim has to offer. Etz Chaim provides numerous avenues to feel connected. Its dynamics allow for members to determine how great a role they want to hold within the synagogue family. We suggest that you step forward and make a commitment to explore one new opportunity to become more deeply involved. You will find your contribution to be a meaningful experience. As we have learned, the concept of including members in all aspects of synagogue programming is not universal.

As we soon will embark on the secular New Year, we wish for you a year filled with special happiness and peace.
