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Message from your President - Simon Newman



PRESIDENT'S MESSAGE

In last month's message I alluded to the fact that running Congregation Etz Chaim was an expensive proposition, as it is for all synagogues. Our synagogue has four main sources of income. These are dues, donations, rental income from the Schilling School, and fundraising. It is the latter source of income that is the subject of this month's discourse.

I am encouraging all of you to become involved in our fundraising efforts. We have a gamut of initiatives that involve varying amounts of time and effort. Simply by removing Box Tops for education labels found on items in your pantry, and bringing them to the synagogue office, you already have helped with fundraising. Also, Kroger and Rempke offer community rewards to our synagogue. In terms of Kroger, you must renew your community rewards designation each April. If you need help with initiating or renewing these community rewards programs, the office can assist. In essence, each time you shop at Kroger or Rempke, the synagogue receives a small percentage of your total grocery purchase.

In house, Stephany Schechtman handles tribute cards. You can send a message to a fellow congregant in honor or remembrance of a special occasion. Again, tribute cards are another easy way to support the synagogue's fundraising efforts.

A new, exciting fundraising initiative instituted by Russ Rosen of the Fundraising Committee is **FOODIE CARDS**. These are decks of 54 cards that provide \$10 off your meal at 54 different restaurants in Cincinnati and Northern KY. You get \$10 off your meal when you spend the restaurant's required minimum that ranges from \$20-\$50. Each deck of Foodie Cards sells for \$30, of which the synagogue gets \$10. Most important is that there is no financial outlay by the synagogue, as we get the decks of cards on consignment. Our immediate goal is to have 40 people each sell 10 decks of cards to raise \$4,000. Already, members of the Steering Committee and the Fundraising Committee are selling Foodie Cards.

What is great about this fundraising initiative is that it is community based. These cards can be sold to friends and co-workers, and make excellent gifts for birthdays, anniversaries, and other special occasions. Because one needs only to use **three** cards to recoup one's investment, it is an easy sell. The decks of cards are good until December 31st each year. Of course, to make this new fundraising project viable, we need your help. We strongly appeal to each congregant to step forward and help sell these cards. To obtain the cards, please contact Russ or the synagogue office. Remember, the more **YOU** do for your synagogue, the more **YOUR** synagogue can do for **YOU**.

OMBUDSMAN

Next, I would like to call your attention to a new proposal from the Membership Committee and the Steering Committee. We are sincere when we state that we want to become aware of your concerns and your compliments. Additionally, we are aware that we need to provide additional channels to bring these to the Steering Committee's attention. We have decided to appoint two ombudsmen with whom congregants can address their specific concerns and feelings. The ombudsmen then will bring those concerns to the Steering Committee. Depending on the particular issue, it will be sent to the appropriate committee for consideration and action. Our two ombudsmen are Stephany Schechtman and Howard Saal. We hope that you will find this new idea beneficial.

It was a very engaging and collaborative effort among everyone on the steering committee.

The mission statement is aimed both at our current members, and at the broader community, capturing the principle of reaching out to the community and reinventing ourselves. It is intended to be inspirational and aspirational. We wanted it to be exciting and stimulating, while capturing who we really are. We as a community will need to work to be everything it suggests, just as we as individuals need to work to fulfill our highest potential.

So – in the spirit of the Passover Haggadah, here is the unpacked version of the mission statement for you as explained on the next page of this bulletin.

Ritual Matters

The ritual committee would like to clarify Etz Chaim service practice when someone is in **shiva or shloshim**. It is considered a mitzvah to daven during Shloshim but with the following exceptions:

- ---One may daven weekday services but not on Shabbat or holidays, as these are festive services.
- ---One is not allowed to have a Torah aliyah, unless it is for a Yahrzeit on that particular day.
- ---One can study Torah for items of mourning or on Tisha b'Av, but not on Shabbat
- ---No Torah lehning is allowed

Torah lehning classes held in January went well. Feedback was positive and we now have a few more Torah lehners to call upon for our services! A big thank you to Jill Segerman for leading classes.

We would like to expand upon this class idea and teach congregants how to lead the weekday minyan services. We expect soon to make this idea a reality.

We continue to look to hire a pastoral care provider for Etz Chaim and have received some additional suggestions including contacting HUC for resource help. Thanks to Hank Lerer for providing pastoral care representing our synagogue these last couple of months.

World Wide Wrap (WWW) was held last month as a Sunday minyan service. Attendees were taught how to lay Tefillin before the service began. Several members of the ritual committee joined others in this event. WWW was celebrated on that day at many synagogues in cities throughout the world.

Our genizah must go! But before burial, we first have to move all boxes from the Kugler Mill site to a designated storage site that Steve Segerman has provided. (thanks, Steve!) The ritcom will soon decide upon a burial day and time, and hopefully include some educational learning at the same time.

Spring Training Shabbat is on March 11 and 12. As with any themed Shabbat services that must first be approved by the ritual committee, the 'Spring Training Shabbat team' brought their ideas to us for final approval and we thank them, as we thank all, for doing this.

The ritcom has embraced davener's choice at Saturday morning services to enable the traditions of our founding congregations to be expressed. In response to those who prefer more consistency in davening we decided to look for opportunities to standardize some parts of our service.

Purim is fast approaching. Come to shul on Wednesday evening, March 23th for a great evening of services, Megillah reading, dinner and "The Schpiel". A special thank you to our Megillah readers who will share the Book of Esther story with us all.





What happens when you volunteer at the OTR Soup Kitchen?

- Etz Chaim volunteers prepare and serve food at the facility. We provide tableware (plates, napkins, cups and plastic dinnerware) and proper set up and cleanup of the facility afterwards.
- Volunteers serve the food and beverages during the noon-1 PM lunch hour.
- The meal includes a meat or casserole, starch, vegetable and/or salad, a dessert and beverage. We provide the volunteer help needed to cook, prepare, serve and clean.
- Etz Chaim volunteers ranging in age from ages 8 to 80+ are needed and welcome. We need approximately 8-10 volunteers each time we work and serve in the facility.
- Volunteers can work in one or two hours shifts or stay the entire time.
- Hours are from 10:30 a.m. until we finish cleaning and lock the doors around 1:30 p.m.


